**Quadrennial Program Plan 2016 - 2019**

### **Introduction**

The Quadrennial Program Plan (QPP) 2016-2019 is the outcome of a collective, participatory process of deliberation and discussions among the diverse constituencies of the APAY. The mandate of the QPP was derived from the 19<sup>th</sup> General Assembly held in Daejeon, Korea, from 6 to 11 September 2016. At the end of the GA, participants came up with a mandate with the title “Building a Sustainable Future as Descendants of Noah” along with the Youth Assembly mandate and the resolution of the outcome of the Cheorwon International Peace Conference held prior to GA.

Those mandates and resolution were the basis for the 3<sup>rd</sup> APAY Leaders Quadrennial Roundtable (LQR) held on 3-6 December 2015 in Chiangmai, where 41 participants from 14 national movements actively participated in drawing up the quadrennial vision and goals as well as identifying relevant tools and programs to translate these vision and goals as outlined below into APAY’s ministry for the next four years. At the close of the LQR, a solid outcome of the meeting was unanimously adopted by the participants. The outcome document was named “Call for Servant Leadership.”

Immediately after the LQR, the outcome document was circulated to all NMs for further inputs and feedback. Thereafter, several productive comments and opinions arrived at the APAY office and those were incorporated into the document. As agreed upon, the APAY staff formulated the QPP document as a draft for submission to the ECM for discussion and adoption.

### **YMCA in Our Context**

YMCA is a movemental organization working to establish God's kingdom on earth, following Jesus' movement. It is, in other words, an association of sisters and brothers who in faith dare to break away from the current unjust, violent, and unsustainable civilization of self-destruction and to pronounce and establish a new order of God's justice, peace, and life by living and practicing it in their grassroots communities. (*quoted from Dr. Chang's keynote address at LQR.*)

### **Quadrennial Vision**

The Asia and Pacific Alliance of YMCAs (APAY) is a non-governmental and not-for-profit civil society movement based on Christian beliefs and values that seeks to empower the people, especially the youth, to be servant-leaders in our YMCAs and in our society to respond to the social realities and to transform their community through creative and innovative approaches.

### **Goals**

With “mission in context” as the constant foundation of our ministry and work, the goals of APAY for this quadrennial (2016-2019) are:

- Youth Empowerment
- Social Relevance
- Institutional Viability

### ***Youth Empowerment***

It was strongly recognized that youth empowerment is integral component for the life of the movement.
