Background

P4G¹ is a global public-private partnership launched in 2018 and consisting of 12 countries and 5 international organizations including the World Economic Forum, the International Finance Corporation, the World Resources Institute, the Global Green Growth Institute, and the C40 Cities. It aims at accelerating market-based solutions to build sustainable and resilient economies, particularly in themes of food, water, energy, cities and the circular economy through impact investment. As of 2020, it has invested in more than 50 partnerships with USD292 million.

Since the adoption of 2030 agenda in 2015, the new form of international cooperation based on the multi-stakeholders has increased in a name of 'partnership'. Particularly, the

¹ P4G is an acronym for the Partnering for Green Growth and the Global Goals 2030. In the beginning, the idea had been initiated by Denmark government in 2011 with the name of the Global Green Growth Forum(3GF), a public-private high-level platform, together with the Republic of Korea. 3GF was transformed to the P4G Summit in 2018. engagement of the business sector in the partnership initiatives for the SDGs implementation is noteworthy.

Global civil society has been concerned about the business friendly partnership initiatives for the SDGs implementation, while little efforts to include civil society voices in the decision-making process that can make the partnership inclusive and ecologically sustainable in structure.

Korean civil society regards the Partnering for Green Growth and the Global Goals 2030(P4G) as one of such international trend. In its first summit, unfortunately, few civil societies groups from its member states have known of it even though such partnership can influence over the national economic policies afterward.

On this background, this forum aims at raising critical awareness of national and local civil society groups on the public and private partnership, not for 'Green Washing' but for 'Green transformation'. And also the importance of civil society's involvement in the P4G process for its inclusiveness and public value will be stressed. On the other hand, diverse cases of grassroots social economy business in 5 themes of the P4G are also presented as a public and private partnership to contribute to protect and manage our commons.

Objectives

- Raise critical awareness of civil society, particularly, the future generation, on the P4G, the international public-private partnership for the climate action and the SDGs implementation;
- Figure out empirically what 'Green Growth' means in the P4G through more than 50 P4G partnerships for the last 3 years and what the difference it has from 'Green Transformation';
- Share grassroots social economy cases of 12 partner countries for green economic recovery after the COVID19;
- 4. Advocate the civil society's collective statement to the P4G Summit calling for establishing a grassroots civil society space to participate in the decisionmaking process of the P4G like a peoples' forum to the P4G Summit as an official session.

This session aims at **exploring what and how we shall do for green recovery** not only from the economic recession after the COVID-19 but also from the sick earth. A partnership among government, civil society, and business is required for green recovery. However, we need to **figure out first what is our commons and how to manage them for the appropriate partnership between the public and private sector in order not to make our commons simply privatized.**

Through the dialogue for action between generations, we can share lessons from the past environmental and social equity movement, and progressive ideas from the future generations based on their own perspective and value for their future world in the context of global climate change and extinction. From the lessons of the past, the future we make can be better. From the will for the future, the future we make can be more promising.
